	Ciaran Griffin (Voluntary Footpath Warden Little Cornard Parish Council) had approached Bures St Mary Parish Council to start some preliminary discussions about the creation of a footpath to link the two parishes. <b>No progress as yet to report on this.</b>	
BWY5	Footpath leading from the end of the Croft to the kissing gate on Sudbury Road. Concerns have been raised by an elderly resident who relies on this footpath as the only access to her property. <b>Due to the pandemic no progress to report</b> but an email describing the issues was sent to County Councillor James Finch prior to the lockdown.	
FP 14,17, 18	Footpaths which run from Clickett Hill to Smallbridge Hall.  There had been an issue with a livestock gate at Little Hall being padlocked as a result of one gate being left open. Happily, the stockman was able to install two kissing gates very promptly to resolve the problem. The County Access Team were consulted but the situation was rectified so quickly that no further action was required. Many thanks to Darren Knox, the stockman.	
F.Y.I.	The Parish Clerk has received a letter, as in previous years, from J.B. Ruggles, Director, of J.S. Wright willow specialists. We have been asked to record that there is no public right of way across his willow plantation which lies to the east of Daws Hall, immediately adjacent to the River Stour on the Suffolk side. The letter states that signage (private- no public right of way) is removed almost immediately after it has been erected. The land in question is in the Parish of Little Cornard.
