Suffolk Music Mark Award – it was very pleasing to learn that the School has been awarded Schools Membership of the Music Mark for the Year 19-20 in recognition of the support given for young people's music making and music education in Suffolk. The School was particularly thrilled to have received this award this year as it has thought carefully about how to ensure a provision of excellent music-related opportunities for all the pupils despite not having a music specialist on the staff team.

Whole School Attendance this academic year currently stands at 96.9%.

On the day we left the EU, to face a new and uncertain future as a nation, the School launched its own list of Growth Mindset type challenges for the children to achieve during their time at Bures. The challenges will be presented to the children as an 'Exploring your Yeti' list encouraging them to try new things and push themselves out of their comfort zone. Mrs Bennie has developed an 'Exploring your Yeti' passport for each pupil which will be kept in school and authenticated each time the children complete one of the challenges. To give an example, one of the challenges is 'Learn to sew, knit or crochet' – the Year 5 and 6 pupils achieved this when they created their decorations to sell at Christmas.
